Wednesday 9th May, 7.30pm *The Scribe of the Soul -* Talk by the author Pat Marsh

It is the first historical novel to look at that period of constant turmoil in Ancient Macedonia and Greece through a woman's eyes. Thursday 24th May, 7.30pm *Jane Austen: Romantic or Ruthless?*


Jane Austen is commonly perceived as an author of cosy and romantic comedies of manners , written with elegance and wit. But there is also a deeper, moral aspect to Austen's work: she was a ruthless observer of humankind, and through her characters exposed its foibles, weaknesses and sometimes even cruelty without bowing to position or class.

Looking at Austen's work as a whole, but with particular reference to two of her lesser known novels, Northanger Abbey & Persuasion, Angela Day will be exploring with us some of these ways in which Jane Austen is an even more important writer than even many of her readers give her credit for.


Thursday 14th June, 7.30pm Book Launch: *The Nature of the Malvern Hills*




that leads from the world of folk-tale and myth, to the battlefields of the First World War, where dreams are shattered, and he must gather the pieces, and try to make them once more into something whole.

We're very excited to be hosting **Tamsin Grey** shortly after the release of her hotly anticipated debut novel *She's Not There*. When Jonah and Raff wake up on Monday, their mother Lucy isn't there. Although Jonah is only nine, he is the big brother, and knows enough about the world to keep her absence a secret. If anyone found out she'd left them alone, it could be disastrous for him and Raff; and she'll be back, he's nearly sure. With growing unease, he puzzles over the clues she's left behind. Who sent her the flowers? Why



are all her shoes still in the house? Why is her phone buried in a plant pot? And who, in their diverse south London community, might know more about her than he does? For fans of My Name is Leon and The Trouble with Goats and Sheep, Tamsin Grey's outstanding debut is tender, funny and unsettling.
